

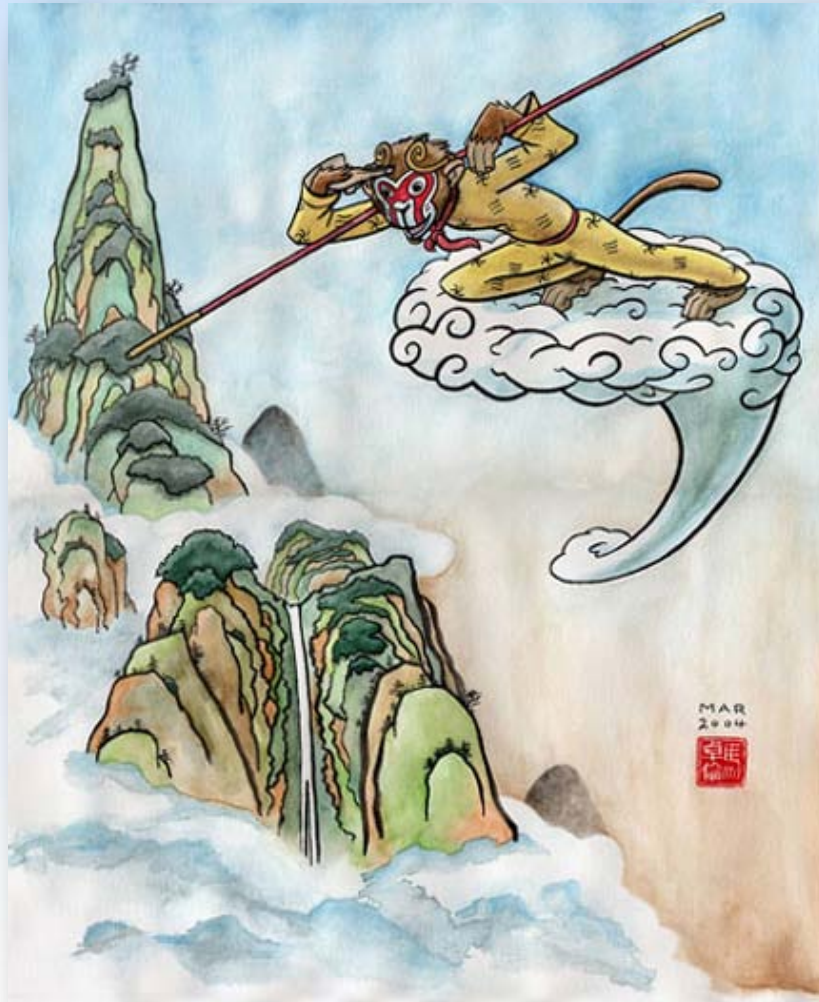

“No guts No Glory” ~adventure~”

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An adventure is an activity that is perceived to involve risky, dangerous or exciting experiences.

The term is often used to refer to activities with some potential for physical danger, such as skydiving, mountain climbing, and participating in extreme sports. However, the term also broadly refers to any enterprise that is potentially full with physical, financial or psychological risk, such as a business venture, a love affair, or other major life events.

An adventurer is a person who bases their lifestyle or their fortunes on adventurous acts. An adventurer or adventuress is a term that usually takes one of three meanings:

One who, travels are unusual and often exotic, though not so unique as to qualify as exploration.

One who lives by their wits.

One who takes part in a risky or speculative course of action for profit or position.

No guts, no glory.

Without courage (guts) there can be no triumph (glory)- The basic idea behind the “no guts, no glory” expression is that one must have courage if s/he wants to succeed. You can use the expression any time you’re facing a difficult situation and you really want to do your best. For example, if you are going to a job interview, you might say it to yourself just before you walk in to the interview in order to inspire yourself and fill yourself with positive energy.

Examples:

””Well, this ski slope looks pretty dangerous, but no guts, no glory, right? I’m just going to take it!””

””I was really nervous before my meeting with the boss, but I decided to have courage and tell him exactly what I was thinking. I was worried what he would say, but no guts, no glory, so I just came out and told him the truth.””

””No guts, no glory. Let’s go! We’re going to win this game and take the league championship!””

””If you really want Marie to go out with you, you’re just going to have to walk up to her and ask here. No guts, no glory man. Just do it.””

Key words:

China’s Yunnan Province is widely regarded as the country’s most culturally diverse and scenically spectacular region. It is home to many colourful ethnic minority groups, each with their own characteristics. Many came from the Muslim regions along the ancient ‘Silk Route’, whilst others migrated from the mountains of Tibet. We immerse ourselves in the age-old customs and traditions of the local Bai and Naxi people, and trek through Tiger Leaping Gorge, one of the few places left in China where you can get off the beaten track.
